2019 Special Olympics Summer World Games Abu Dhabi

The Road to Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates, for our very own Special Olympics Ohio athletes Jabari Wilson and Garrett Ford, was one that would shine brighter than any world champion could possibly dream. As proud members of Team USA, Jabari and Garrett were part of over 7,500 athletes competing in 24 Olympics-Style events from 200 nations to embark on this record-breaking global movement of inclusion – one that would forever change the world. From March 14th- 21st, the largest sports and humanitarian event on the planet was a momentous display of inclusivity, unity, respect, and sporting achievement. This was truly a movement by people of determination for people of determination—and for everyone else. Our inspiring World Champions, Jabari and Garrett, brought back not only FIVE Gold Medals but the fond memories of an experience to last a lifetime.

Jabari "Mr. Speed" Wilson

Jabari spent most of his time competing in Athletics at the Dubai Police Club Stadium. Jabari's determination in the five events that make up the Pentathlon, 100-meter run, long jump, shot put, high jump, and 400-meter run, brought home the Gold. Jabari also had the opportunity to proudly run with his Team USA teammates in the 4x100meter relay for a 7th place ribbon.

Jabari and his family were able to enjoy the UAE for two days during the competitions. They visited the Dubai Museum and learned about some of Dubai's history. Jabari met a young Navy Seaman that saw Jabari's USA uniform and credentials and said he would be honored if he could take a picture with Jabari; they thanked him for his service and told him it was an honor to take a picture with him. From there, they toured and took pics at Jumeira Beach near the Burj Al Arab Hotel and the amusement park Global Village, which is a lot like Disney's EPCOT Center.

"It was an honor to be chosen to participate in the World Games; it was a great experience for me. I met new friends both from the USA and other countries. I enjoyed trying the different foods in Dubai. I love the opening ceremonies and competing. It was one of the best experiences in my life."

Garrett "The Hulk" Ford

Garrett owned the powerlifting stage at the Abu Dhabi National Exhibition Center and brought back four Gold Medals: Bench Press, Deadlift, and Squat, and all-around Combined Squat, Bench Press, and Deadlift. Garrett's success landed him the exclusive opportunity to be featured as one of only three athletes in the UEA Embassy's documentary "The Road to Abu Dhabi.

"The experience was definitely one the entire family will never forget, as they had an amazing time and met so many great people. The Powerlifting Team coaches, parents, and athletes all still stay in touch. They quickly became like a little family while in Abu Dhabi, all supporting and cheering on each others' athletes. Garrett's family wasn't able to sightsee much due to Garrett's powerlifting competition schedule, but they were able to enjoy the beach, went to The Grand Mosque, and toured the Emirates Palace and the city. They spent more of their time at the ADNEC, where the majority of the events were being held in Abu Dhabi. They truly enjoyed watching the other sports taking place as well and cheering on all the amazing athletes.

"The food was different, but it was very good. That was one of my favorite things. The people I met and the friends I made are something special I take away from my experience in Abu Dhabi. I have made friends that I believe I will always have in my life. We all have a common bond, and it's comforting. The Opening Ceremonies were very exciting and even more so because I got to be involved with it and got to meet some famous athletes. I got to be on stage with Finn Balor, and that was extremely cool. I am so thankful for the opportunity I had to go to World Games and even more so because I set a goal for myself, and I was able to achieve that goal by winning four gold medals. Those four gold medals mean so much, and every time I look at them, I think about all the amazing things from World Games, and how truly blessed I was to get to go and be a part of it."

"Garrett met so many people and made a lot of new friends. He still stays in touch with his teammates and also stays in touch with a fellow powerlifter he became friends with from Canada. A big memorable moment was when he lost his phone and the Second Lady of the United States, Karen Pence, happened to find it. That was a big highlight and was such an honor for Garrett. He got to meet some other big-name Powerlifters like Larry Wheels and Hafpor Bjornsson " The Mountain." They took the time to talk some and get pictures. Garrett was living the dream, and his smile showed it. Our family is so grateful for all the support and the opportunities Garrett has had. It's been one incredible ride for sure! When we found out Garrett was getting the opportunity to compete in the World Games, we were so excited and happy for him. To see how hard he works, doing what he loves and for it to pay off in a huge way, was more than we could have ever hoped for."

2019 Athlete Leadership Program

2019 was a year full of growth for our Athlete Leadership program! Athlete Leadership training took place throughout the year and at our Fall Leadership Conference. Athletes were able to attend in-person training in all four regions of the state. Over 100 new Athlete Leaders received training. Athlete Leaders also gave media interviews, hosted ceremonies, and spoke to large groups. The State-Wide Athlete Input Council was also formed in 2019, with their first meeting taking place in December. The AIC is made up of 8 trained Athlete Leaders from Ohio. They offer advice, provide feedback, and assist with statewide guidance.



HEALTHY ATHLETES

What is Healthy Athletes?

A program that provides free health screenings and health education in a fun, welcoming environment with a focus on removing the anxiety people with intellectual disabilities often experience when facing a medical professional. Healthy Athletes also allows health care students and professionals to expand their knowledge of best practices in caring for people with intellectual disabilities through hands-on experience.

Since launching in Ohio, Healthy Athletes has discovered undetected health problems, alleviated pain, and provided health services that otherwise would not be available to **more than 8,000 athletes.**

UNIFIED CHAMPION SCHOOLS

With sports as the foundation, **Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools** offer proven programs and activities that equip young people with tools and training to create sports, classroom, and community experiences that improve attitudes and behaviors among all young people, both with and without intellectual disabilities.

Unified Champion Schools promote social inclusion by bringing together young people with and without disabilities on sports teams, through inclusive student clubs, and in school or community-wide initiatives.



The Impact of Unified Champion Schools

- Schools and community environments become more welcoming to people of all abilities
- Socially inclusive school climates become free from teasing, bullying and the exclusion of any group of students
- Students without disabilities hold more positive attitudes toward their peers with disabilities
- Special Olympics is viewed as a school and community partner that offers inclusive programming that benefits all students
